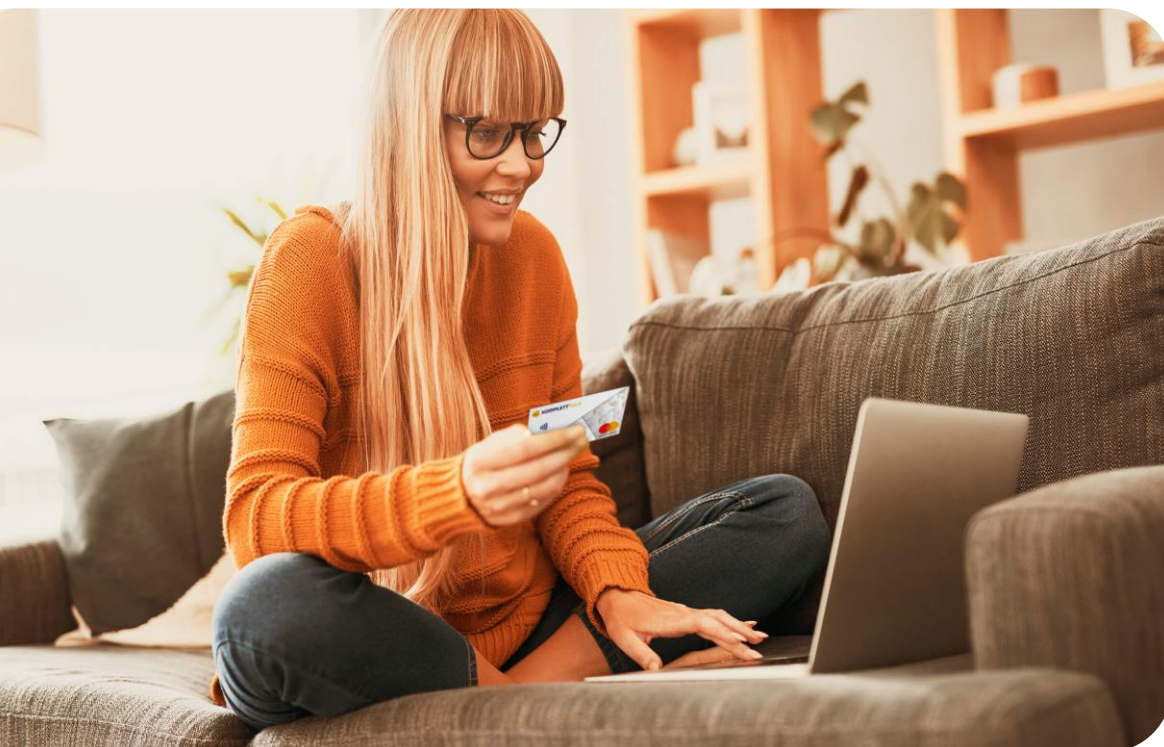


Interim report

SECOND QUARTER 2021



Highlights and key figures

- Komplett Bank returned to loan growth in Q2 and is on track for around 5% growth in 2021. Expected continued loan growth from existing portfolio, further geographical expansion in 2022
- Underlying credit quality was stable; high repayments in June contributed to a decline in volumes sent to collection, past due balances and loan loss ratio.
- The Bank expects 2021 profitability below 2020 as consumer credit demand lagged expectations and market changes have put pressure on yields; loan growth and efficiency measures are expected to drive profit growth in 2022.
- Komplett Bank paid out its first ever dividend during Q2, and has a solid capital position with capacity for continued growth and dividends.
- The Board of Directors has appointed Mr. Øyvind Oanes as new CEO, effective from 1 October 2021.

Financial performance

- Net loans increased by NOK 312.0 million for the full quarter, compared to a decrease of NOK 319.4 million in Q1 2021. Adjusted for currency effects and portfolio sales, net loans increased by NOK 260.8 million, compared to a decrease of NOK 61.4 million in the previous quarter.
- Total income was NOK 240.8 million, down 5.9% compared to NOK 255.8 million in Q1 2021.
- Total operating expenses increased to NOK 108.4 million from NOK 98.3 million.
- The cost/income ratio was 45.0%, up from 38.4% in Q1 2021.
- Losses on loans were NOK 65.1 million, compared to NOK 73.8 million in Q1 2021.
- The loan loss ratio was 3.2%, down from 3.8% in Q1 2021.
- Profit after tax was NOK 50.0 million, down from NOK 62.7 million in Q1 2021.
- Return on equity (ROE)* was 9.3%, down from 12.0% in Q1 2021. At the Bank's target CET1 ratio of 18.0%, ROE would be 12.6% for the quarter.

Capital adequacy

- Komplett Bank's CET1 ratio decreased to 22.3% by end Q2 2021 from 22.5% at end Q1 2021, as a consequence of non-inclusion of both actual and expected dividend pay-outs and loan growth.
- Total capital ratio decreased to 25.4% by end Q2 from 26.1% at end Q1 2021 due to buy-back of tier 2 capital of NOK 42 million in the quarter.

About Komplett Bank ASA

Komplett Bank ASA (the “Bank”) started operations in March 2014 when the company received its banking licence from the Norwegian authorities. Komplett Bank focuses on offering convenient consumer financing products.

The Bank’s main products are consumer loans, comprising Komplett Bank’s annuity loans launched in May 2019 as well as a flexible loan product with functionality that gives the customer more flexibility in use of the credit line. In April 2020, the Bank launched a new refinancing product in Norway. In addition, the Bank offers “Komplett Bank Mastercard”, a credit card with product features tailored for online shopping as well as Point of Sales (POS) finance products. The Bank offers deposit products with highly attractive interest rates in Norway, Germany and Sweden. As a member of the Norwegian Banks’ Guarantee Fund, customer deposits are guaranteed up to NOK 2 million (EUR 100,000 in Germany and Sweden) per customer.

The Bank follows a strategic roadmap based on geographical and product-wise diversification and expansion. The strategy is founded on a digital, scalable, efficient and low-cost operating model combined with strong risk control. In the near- to medium term, lending operations will be focused on the Nordic region and the Bank will continue its expansion by developing its current product portfolio in existing markets. The Bank has a long-term strategic cooperation with Komplett Group.

The Bank operates on a cross-border basis from Lysaker, outside of Oslo. The Norwegian banking license provides for passporting of the Bank’s offering throughout the entire European Economic Area (EEA).

Covid-19 update

As a response to the outbreak of Covid-19, Komplett Bank implemented measures to safeguard employees and their families in line with national recommendations. The organisation has adapted well to the situation and operational productivity and customer service level have been maintained during the quarter.

Customer behaviour has largely been unchanged since the Covid-19 outbreak in 2020, however, during the first half of 2021 the Bank experienced an increase in customer amortisations as customers’ liquidity improved. During this period Komplett Bank has received a limited number of forbearance requests and has focused on assisting existing customers to overcome short-term challenges during the pandemic. No material impact on withdrawals was experienced. The Bank has not experienced any negative impact on default rates so far and underlying credit quality was stable from the previous quarter.

Financial figures for Q2 2021

All figures are prepared and presented in accordance with IFRS.

Net loans increased by NOK 312.0 million in the quarter. Split on product segments, loans increased by NOK 346.4 million, credit cards decreased by NOK 8.1 million and point of sales (POS) financing decreased by NOK 26.3 million.

Adjusted for currency effects and portfolio sales as part of the forward flow agreement, net loans increased by NOK 260.8 million in Q2 2021. The Bank cautiously re-started onboarding of new loans in June 2020, continuing this practice during H2 2020 and the first half year of 2021.

Net interest income amounted to NOK 230.7 million, down 2.6% from NOK 236.9 million in Q1 2021.

From Q4 2020 sales commission to agents is presented in the "Interest income", earlier "Expenses commissions and fees", and comparable figures have been recalculated (note 15). Net commissions and fees amounted to NOK 10.4 million in Q2 2021, down from NOK 12.0 million in the previous quarter.

The total income was NOK 240.8 million, down 5.9% compared to NOK 255.8 million in Q1 2021. The total income decline compared to the previous quarter was mainly driven by lower yield on loan portfolio (NOK -6 million) and negative return on liquid assets (NOK -7 million). The yield decline is driven by new sales at lower yields replacing loans churning at higher yields, with refinancing loans driving growth in Norway and the temporary interest cap

and marketing restriction in Finland being the most significant contributors.

Operating expenses were NOK 108.4 million, up 10.3% from NOK 98.3 million in Q4 2020. Salary and other personnel expenses increased to NOK 41.5 million in the quarter from NOK 37.9 million in Q1 2021, driven by the general wage settlement and investments in solidity and growth.

General administrative expenses increased to NOK 38.5 million, up from NOK 33.5 million in Q1 2021. The increase was caused by marketing expenses increasing by NOK 2 million, reflecting the loan growth in the quarter, and an ongoing data analytics project to improve processes and profitability, contributing to a further NOK 2 million to

The cost-income ratio was 45.0% in Q2 2021 compared to 38.4% in the previous quarter and 35.2% for the full financial year in 2020.

Losses on loans amounted to NOK 65.1 million, down from NOK 73.8 million in Q1 2021. The annualised loan loss ratio was 3.2%, down from 3.8% in Q1 2021. The Q2 loan loss ratio was positively impacted by high repayments from customers in June.

Profit after tax was NOK 50.0 million, down 20.3% from NOK 62.7 million in the previous quarter. The decline in Q2 was mainly driven by the decline in yield, negative return on investments for liquid assets and increased operating expenses.

Total assets at 30 June 2021 amounted to NOK 11,627 million (compared to NOK 11,644 million at 31 March 2021). Net loans to customers ended at NOK 8,354 million

(NOK 8,042 million). Deposits from customers amounted to NOK 9,115 million (NOK 9,006 million).

Total equity stood at NOK 2,288 million (NOK 2,318 million at 31 March 2021) which includes distribution of a dividend of NOK 78.5 million. Komplett Bank had a total capital ratio of 25.4% (26.1%), and a CET1 ratio of 22.3% (22.5%) as of 30 June 2021. Bank deposits and liquid securities amounted to NOK 3,093 million (NOK 3,429 million) corresponding to 26.6% (29.4%) of total assets.

Gross defaulted loans at the end of Q2 2021 amounted to NOK 2,246 million, up from NOK 2,237 million (+0.5%) at 31 March 2021. The implementation of a new default definition from the European Banking Authority (EBA) resulted in a one-off migration implementation effect of NOK 175.1 million at the end of Q1 2021, from stage 1 and 2, to stage 3. At the end of Q2 2021, this amount was NOK 83.4 million. Loan impairments amounted to NOK 1,226 million (NOK 1,157 million).

Regulatory update

In 2020, Finland's parliament approved the government's proposal of a legislative change that includes a temporary 10% p.a. interest cap on new loans down from previously 20%, as well as a ban on direct marketing to consumers. These restrictions apply until end of September 2021. The government has communicated that a potential permanent regulation is being investigated without giving any further

details on timing, or type or level of potential limitations.

EU endorsed new regulations in connection with Capital Requirements Regulation (CRR) to tightening capital requirements related to non-performing loans (the so-called backstop-regulation) in April 2019. The aim is to secure sufficient capital to meet future expected losses. In Norway the hearing process ended in February 2020 and the Norwegian FSA proposed on 30 September 2020 to include the recommendation into Norwegian law. Komplett Bank does not expect the backstop rule to have material impact in 2021. The expectation is that the impact will be limited also in 2022 as the Bank has a forward flow contract in place and new sales in Norway have been relatively low from mid-2019.

On 18 December 2020, the European Systemic Risk Board (ESRB) issued a new recommendation to national authorities to request banks and insurers to refrain from making dividend distributions etc. until 30 September 2021, unless the institutions apply caution and the distributions do not exceed the conservative thresholds set by the national supervisory authorities.

The Norwegian Ministry of Finance made the decision on 17 June 2021 to increase the countercyclical capital buffer to 1.5% from 1.0%, being effective from 30 June 2022.

The new Market Abuse Regulation (MAR) entered into effect in Norway March 1, 2021. The rules contain prohibition of insider trading, unlawful disclosure of inside information and market manipulation, as

well as measures for the authorities to prevent and detect breaches of such clauses.

At the end of March, the Norwegian Ministry of Finance announced that the amendments to the Capital Requirements Regulation for Banks (CRR2), to apply in the EU from June 2021, will not enter into force in the EEA Agreement at the same time.

Outlook

Komplett Bank follows a diversified multi-channel marketing and distribution strategy, has a strong financial position with a resilient balance sheet and a flexible and low-cost operating model. This, combined with a well-known brand and strong distribution capabilities, puts the Bank in a favourable competitive position.

The Bank's strategy for product-wise and geographical expansion is the cornerstone to ensuring long-term sustainable growth and value creation. Going forward, Komplett Bank will continue to focus on creating customer value through convenient financing solutions and efficient and customer friendly processes.

The Bank has decided to expand its current footprint through entering a new country within the EU during 2022 with planning still in an early phase.

The Bank considers the potential for growth in the Nordics in the medium term as good. With reference to the current interest cap and marketing restriction in Finland, Komplett Bank does not expect material impact from the temporary legislation on existing customers. However, new sales in

Finland is negatively impacted as long as restrictions remain in force.

Due to macroeconomic uncertainty related to Covid-19, Komplett Bank has increased focus on assisting existing customers while continuing to be prudent on risk selection in the first two quarters of 2021. The Bank restarted onboarding of new customers in June 2020 and reported net loan growth in Q4 2020 and Q2 2021 respectively.

In the first half of 2021, consumer credit demand has however lagged the Bank's expectations, and growth has come mainly from refinancing in Norway, while market changes have put pressure on yields. This is possibly caused by improvements in households' liquidity due to prudent spending during covid.

Based on the performance year to date and current market dynamics and outlook, the Bank now expects loan growth of around 5% (5-10% previously) in 2021 and net profit below 2020 (above 2020 previously).

Komplett Bank has high ambitions for growth and value creation going forward. The Bank expects to improve total income, driven by both expected loan balance growth in existing product markets, as well as expansions to new markets, more than compensating for the continued yield decline in the near to medium term,

The cost/income ratio is expected to improve, driven by operating leverage as loan balance grows in combination with effects from initiated efficiency measures becoming fully realized. In addition, further cost and efficiency measures currently under review will be implemented.

The Bank expects a stable development in loan losses. Positive drivers include operational improvements in data analytics and credit decisioning, and while Covid-19 continues to create uncertainty near-term risk levels should ease as the pandemic abates. At the same time, expansion in new markets will initially imply higher loan losses.

In addition to total income growth and effects from efficiency measures, Komplett Bank expects more efficient capital allocation to positively impact ROE going forward.

Based on the recent financial performance and current capital position, the Bank considers its dividend capacity to be 30-50% of annual profit after tax while maintaining ample capacity for growth in the medium term.

Komplett Bank's attractive customer value proposition coupled with stable financial performance, a flexible cost base and solid capital position provide a strong platform for value creation.

The Bank's main strategic priorities for 2021 are to maintain activity levels and improve customer acquisition processes to ensure continued loan growth, maintain high focus on credit risk and collection performance to ensure stable credit performance, drive operational excellence with maintained and enhanced focus on costs and efficiency to improve cost/income ratio and ensure solid capital position with capacity for both growth and dividends.

Financial targets

The Bank has established the following long-term financial targets:

1. Capital Adequacy:

CET1 target of 18.0%

- Comprised of CET1 requirement of 17.0% + 1.0% management buffer

2. Return on Equity

Above 20% return on equity

3. Dividend policy

Excess capital not deployed for growth and solidity will be distributed to shareholders

Risks and uncertainties

Komplett Bank's operations and results are subject to a range of risks and uncertainties. The Bank's framework for managing financial risks is described in the Annual report for 2020. Below is a description of select major risk factors that may affect Komplett Bank in the second half of 2021, including macroeconomic risks, reputation risk and regulatory risks.

Reduced economic growth, increasing unemployment and diminishing savings rates could reduce demand for consumer financing from credit worthy individuals, reduce existing customers' ability to service their loans and limit the Bank's access to capital. Implemented mitigating actions include Komplett Bank's geographical diversification, strengthening of refinancing offering, continuous surveillance of risk

development in loan portfolio and a forbearance strategy to help customer with temporary challenges in servicing their loans.

Damage to the Bank's reputation could reduce access to customers, capital and liquidity. Actions performed to minimize such risk include the implementation of strong corporate governance framework, and regular training of all employees within anti-corruption and money-laundering with 100% completion rate in 2020.

Regulatory tightening could reduce the Bank's ability to grow, its profitability and increase the cost of capital. In addition to the geographical and product wise diversification, Komplett Bank has implemented processes to continuously strengthen the Bank's agile culture and adaptability.

Please refer to the Annual Report for 2020 for a thorough review of the Bank's corporate governance practices including policies, guidelines and routines related to

managing credit risk, operational risk, liquidity risk and market risk.

Significant events after the balance sheet date

The board is not aware of any other significant events after the date of the balance sheet that may be of material significance to the accounts.

Related parties

There have not been any changes or transactions with related parties during the first half of 2021 that significantly impact Komplett Bank's financial position or results for the period.

Other information

The accounting result for Q2 2021 has in its entirety been booked against retained earnings. This interim report has been reviewed in accordance with ISRE 2410 (International Standard on Review Engagement). The review report is enclosed to this report.

Note 1 - General accounting principles

The condensed interim financial statements have been prepared in accordance with IAS 34, Interim Financial Reporting.

All numbers in this report are in NOK 1,000,000 unless otherwise specified.

Note 2 – Loans to customers

The Bank is applying forward looking elements for its credit loss model. The overall losses are adjusted by considering a certain set of macro-economic variables. The credit losses are adjusted on a portfolio basis and are based on the expected development of the economies in the countries in which the Bank is offering loans. The macro-economic variables are not utilised to transfer loans among the various stages.

The Bank is applying several estimates and factors summed up in three sets of indicators to the expected credit loss models for the respective countries: 1) the expected development in the unemployment rate, 2) the growth in the gross domestic product and 3) the short-term interest rate level. The expected credit loss model employs forecasted data for the years 2021-2023, which corresponds to the expected lifetime of the Bank's loan portfolio. The forecasted data are based on macro-economic indicators sourced from a specialised provider.

The Bank applies three scenarios when considering the macro-economic adjustment: a positive outlook, a neutral outlook and a negative outlook. The Bank calculates and assigns a probability and weight to each of these scenarios based on the forecasts and expectations for the macroeconomic situation. There are uncertainties related to the estimates as they are forward-looking. The total loss provision related to macro-economic factors amounts to a total of NOK 14.4 million.

* Defaulted loans comprise, amongst other, of loans which are 91 days or more overdue according to agreed payment schedule. Such loans continue to be considered defaulted regardless of future payment status. Defaulted loans also comprise of loans with indications of unlikeliness to pay.

With the alignment of the new default definition (DoD) according to the EBA-guidelines effective from 2021, the Bank migrated NOK 175.1 million in gross loans from stage 1 and stage 2 to stage 3 in Q1 2021. For the second quarter the closing balances amounts to NOK 83.4 million. This resulted in a one-off migration of NOK 27.5 million in increased loan impairment in stage 3 in Q1 2021. In Q2 the corresponding impairment amounts to NOK 15.2 million.

Note 12 - Related parties

Komplett Bank is financially and operationally independent of Komplett AS and its affiliated companies (the "Komplett Group").

Komplett AS and the Bank have entered into a cooperation agreement in relation to IP rights, marketing cooperation and other services. The agreement aims to give the Bank the right to use "Komplett Bank" as its name, and the profile and graphic design of www.komplett.no. The agreement gives the Bank the right to use all the intellectual property rights of Komplett AS that are necessary to achieving this purpose.

As an extension to the cooperation agreement, Komplett AS and the Bank have entered into an agreement on product cooperation in relation to the credit card of the Bank and the credit card's ancillary customer loyalty bonus programme. The agreement aims to promote sales and the use of the credit card, as well as contributing to promote sales for Komplett AS. Pursuant to this agreement, the parties shall arrange for customer loyalty bonus in relation to the use of the Bank's credit card on, among other, purchases from Komplett AS. The product cooperation agreement for credit cards was prolonged Q2 2018 for another 5 years.

Furthermore, the Bank is engaged in a cooperation with the Komplett Group, in particular in connection with its credit card product as well as its payment solutions and distribution of Point-of-sales finance products, which enables the Bank to distribute its products towards customers on Komplett's web shop platforms.

Kistefos AS is the Bank's largest shareholder with an ownership of approximately 24 %. There have been no transactions between Komplett Bank ASA and Kistefos AS in Q2 2021.

Note 13 - Leasing agreements

Komplett Bank is leasing premises for Vollsveien 2A and 2B at Lysaker, Norway. The agreement expires 31.12.2023, and the annual rent totals NOK 4.5 million excluding VAT. The Bank has no other significant leasing agreements.

Note 14 – Contingent liabilities

The tax authorities disagree with the Bank`s treatment of reverse charge of VAT for certain services after their local control for the period January 2017 to April 2018. Komplett Bank disagrees with the provisional conclusion, and there is no provision recognized in the interim statement for the period ending on June 30, 2021.

The timing of the final conclusion by the tax authorities and the conclusion itself, are uncertain. If the Bank elects to accept the tax authority`s conclusion or the case goes to a court with a negative outcome for the Bank, the estimated negative cash flow impact based on the above amounts to a total of NOK 2.2 million.

Note 15 – Restated financial figures for comparison purposes

The Bank changed their accounting practices of sales commission to agents and establishment fees in Q4 2020. Sales commissions to agents were previously booked against expenses commission, and fees and establishment fees against income commission and fees. From Q4 2020 both are booked against interest income. The following table illustrates the changes in the comparable numbers in Q2 2020 from original report for the second quarter in 2020. The total income is not affected by these changes.
